# TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2020

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 30 April 2020.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)".

### Objectives and activities

The charity's objects are:

For the public benefit, the relief of the mental sickness of Veterans, Reservists and family members of the armed forces with post-traumatic symptoms in particular by the provision of counselling, therapy and support by:

- Promoting research into treating post-traumatic symptoms, and to promote new ways of providing services for Veterans of the armed forces suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), across the UK;
- Advancing the education of veterans of the armed forces and the public about the mechanisms of trauma and means of reducing the impact of PTSD on Veterans of the armed forces and the population in general; and
- Promoting social inclusion among Veterans of the armed forces with PTSD in prisons through counselling, therapy and support.

PTSD Resolution (hereinafter referred to as Resolution) provides free treatment to Military Veterans. Reservists and their families, (hereinafter referred to as clients), with the particular aim of helping those who have failed to reintegrate into a normal work and family life because of military trauma suffered during service in the armed forces. Trauma causes flashbacks, nightmares, anger and depression - often leading to violence, alcohol and substance abuse, job loss, family breakdown and even suicide.

PTSD Resolution has a nationwide network of 200 accredited Human Givens therapists, which provides treatment to enable Veterans, Reservists and families to resolve the mental health problems associated with military trauma that obstruct a normal range of family and work relationships. PTSD Resolution provides a national low-cost phone line on which Veterans, Reservists, and their families can receive advice on the effects of trauma and available routes to treatment, including our own.

Resolution's research purpose has been met through contributing to a Queen's University Belfast project on Veterans' Transition; The Veterans Strategy consultation; the analysis of our own on-line survey; the creation of a new on-line survey; responding to four different university research requests for information; and five different individual requests.

PTSD Resolution continues to raise awareness through a PR and marketing programme. This programme of pompunication targets trauma sufferers, potential donors, related military and health organisations as well as press and other interested parties. The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake. The Trustees consider that the activities described above are consistent with the Charity's objectives and fulfils the requirements of the Charity Commission's public benefit criteria.

### Achievements and performance

a) Resolution at year-end is on its 2,770th treatment; representing 438 new referrals in the year - an increase of 86 over the previous year - an average of 9 new referrals a week. Additionally, we have reopened 32 former cases with complex PTSD, requiring second or third periods of treatment. This demand is likely to increase, in the future, especially given the reduced services from other military charities due to Covid, putting strains on fundraising and administration.

- b) Resolution has treated a total of 107 veteran prisoners to date, in 23 different prisons, for PTSD and other mental health conditions.
- c) Resolution continues to offer therapy to family members affected by trauma and has treated 61 family members in this reporting year.
- d) We continue to treat every ex-service person who makes contact and wishes to try the service. We offer new clients the opportunity to talk to a previous patient if they wish, then they are put in touch with our nearest therapist and can go for an initial discussion to talk over how they are, what they need, what we can offer and what we cannot do. Clients continue to be given an appointment for treatment to start within a few days. The results of the treatments continue to be measured by taking the impact of event scores before and after treatment, which shows a marked reduction of symptoms, in an average of five sessions per treatment.
- e) We instituted an extra requirement for newly registered therapists, confirmed by their supervisor, that they were ready to accept referrals, based on a review of their work to date.
- f) We engaged an extra administrator in the role of Social Support and Aftercare. This role takes requests from therapists for helping to meet the social support needs of clients as well as contacting clients from 3 to 6 months after the end of treatment in order to measure the sustainability of treatment.
- g) A pilot exercise was initiated into setting up a Post Treatment Support Network (PTSN) for ex-clients. Three were started, in Cornwall, Kent and Scotland, with varying results. Their purpose is to offer an opportunity at a local level for Veterans who have received treatment to be able to meet each other and engage in a mutually supportive activity. Toward the end of the reporting year, the Coronavirus forced a lockdown resulting in seeing whether an on-line network would be feasible. The results of this have yet to be evaluated.
- h) The decision by Combat Stress in January to stop taking referrals from England and Wales resulted in an increase in referrals. The first Coronavirus lockdown on 23 March saw an initial reduction in referrals on a like-for-like, year on year basis, however, this report only covers those first five weeks.
- j) The Coronavirus lockdown has also meant that therapy has had to be offered on-line. This was already offered for clients who were hard to access, or who could not travel, but was promoted as being available to all and initial results and veteran reactions are very promising.
- k) Discussions with the NHS about partnership working continue and we continue to receive referrals from GPs, TILS, and CTS.
- I) Membership of Cobseo continues to benefit us in various ways, not least in awareness-raising. SSAFA and other charities have increased their referrals to us which is very pleasing. Helpfully, the Veterans' Gateway passes referrals to us from their helpline, and we are on their website leading, we hope, to becoming one of their official referral partners.
- m) Discussions are on-going with several other military charities to create more partnerships and joined-up thinking.
- n) We remain committed to carefully monitoring and producing evidence-based proof of the therapeutic impact Human Givens Therapy has on the veterans, reservists and the families we help. On our website, you can read about how this practical, rapid and effective therapy has saved and changed lives. It is also worth reiterating that we are referenced by NICE and conform to their guidelines.
- o) We are promoting individual and group Trauma Awareness Training workshops and have now launched an on-line training service. The reasons why we feel this is so important is primarily to reduce the stigma attached to mental health and secondly to help educate companies, organisations and their teams on this critically important issue.
- p) We held a successful conference in London on the 18th May 2019, details of which can be seen at https://otsdresolution.org/conference-2019.php.

q) We launched a new online survey on the Veterans' Mental Health Journey and a promotional video called 'Drop the Mask'.

### PR/Marketing

PR and marketing continue to achieve excellent results with very limited expenditure. There are no salaried staff and we do very little advertising – success is delivered via traditional PR and social media. Key features of the year are:-

Social media: we are very active and post almost daily to Facebook, with over 5,000 Followers, and via Twitter and Instagram. Through these avenues and Just Giving, we receive donations from a range of sponsored initiatives by supporters. Looking forward, as with other charities, we expect that some of our future fundraising sources will be affected by the pandemic.

<u>Traditional and broadcast media</u>: we are 'on the radar' of the national print media, especially the defence correspondents, and are often asked to contribute and comment when military PTSD stories are written or talked about. Wherever possible we take part in national and local radio and TV programmes as they represent an important opportunity to increase awareness of the help we provide.

### Event activities include:

- VIP Event at the House of Lords this major annual event was a great success in November 2019 and will be a Zoom webinar on Nov 10th 2020
- The Big Give matched funding: we hit our targets again through a coordinated campaign that brought in major sponsors
- Liaison and fundraising through corporate supporters: we are always looking to find those individuals or companies who want to do more to support the armed forces veteran community
- Security Industry: we continue to work closely with ASIS and the sector in general many veterans inevitably
  end up in the security business, so it makes sense to keep close links

### **Fundraising**

Once again ASIS have continued in their excellent support of our Charity and their donations have continued to make a significant impact on our ability to deliver the services.

The arrangements with the Lions Club and FDM group are providing a useful income in payment for case by case from local groups who can see how their donation is being used for the treatment of Clients within their area.

Fundraising sponsorship events initiated by the public through Just Giving and other platforms are a great way of supporting us. We also, of course, continued to receive grants from bequests, charities, companies and individuals – all of which are important streams of revenue and we dedicate time and effort to produce the applications and information as required.

Lottery England continued to support us in the year, however, looking forward to the year ahead, it is inevitable that their ability to fund us will be significantly impacted due to Covid.

We take this opportunity to thank the Armed Forces Covenant Fund, the Veterans' Foundation and Lest We Forget Association for their very generous support and are so grateful for all they do to help us.

The Trustees thank each and every donor for their vital support to enable us to treat a record number of Veterans.

### Financial review

The revenue increased from £259,032 in 2019 to £289,894. The increase was primarily due to the growth in income from a contract provided for counselling services entered into during the previous year. Income from Donation and gifts have remained broadly the same.

Total resources expended increased by 63% to £303,987. This resulted in a deficit of £14,094 as compared to a surplus of £67,468 in the prior year.

The growth in resources expended was mainly caused by the costs of paying for treatment of an additional 86 Clients as compared to the previous year.

In note 6 to the accounts, the breakdown of the costs allocated to the different activities we undertake is shown. It shows that a total of £264,793 was expended in pursuit of the charitable purposes compared with £163,411 in the previous year. This represents 87% of the total costs.

### Reserves policy

Our policy, in keeping with Charity Commission guidelines, is always to ensure that our Reserves allow for a minimum of three months operating costs and to maintain a secure financial footing. Reserves stand at £54,893 at the closed balance sheet date.

### Risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

### Plans for the future

The targets for next year are:

- a) Treat more Veterans, Reservists and families of the UK armed forces
- b) Teach more Veterans, companies and other organisations about the effects of trauma
- c) Continue to build sustainable sources of revenue
- d) Continue to raise awareness of trauma and modern approaches to relieving it, in order to attract donors, media and other interested parties
- f) Continue to build the evidence base using the Pragmatic Tracker application
- g) Engage in a trial to further evaluate the evidence of treatment outcomes
- h) Create Post Treatment Support Networks in selected centres of the veteran population, engaging ex-clients in socially supporting activities and fundraising
- j) Partnership with the Veterans Gateway
- k) Obtain full membership of Contact

### Structure, governance and management

The charity is a limited company, incorporated on 22 April 2009 and registered as a charity on 8 December 2009.

The President is Lord Ramsbotham, and Lord Arbuthnot is Vice-President.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2020

### 1 Accounting policies

### Company information

PTSD Resolution Limited is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Chantry House, 22 Upperton Road, Eastbourne, East Sussex, BN21 1BF.

### 1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the charity's articles of association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest  $\mathfrak{L}$ .

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

### 1.2 Going concern

The Trustees recognise that funds held at the year end are below the amount required by the Charity's reserves policy. Following the year end the Charity won a large contract to provide therapy services and significant funds were received shortly after the year end.

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

### 1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

### 1 Accounting policies (Continued)

### 1.5 Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised when a constructive obligation exists, the payment is probable and the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular cost centre to which they relate and include irrecoverable VAT.

### 1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

### 1.7 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

### Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include trade and other receivables and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

### Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including trade and other payables and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade payables are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade payables are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

### Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

### 1.8 Taxation

PTSD Resolution Limited is a registered charity and its income is considered exempt from United Kingdom taxation.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2020

### 2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

### 3 Donations and legacies
