# TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2022

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 30 April 2022.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)".

#### Objectives and activities

The charity's objects are:

For the public benefit, the relief of the mental sickness of Veterans, Reservists and family members of the armed forces with post-traumatic symptoms in particular by the provision of counselling, therapy and support by:

- 1. Promoting research into treating post-traumatic symptoms, and to promote new ways of providing services for Veterans of the armed forces suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), across the UK;
- 2. Advancing the education of veterans of the armed forces and the public about the mechanisms of trauma and means of reducing the impact of PTSD on Veterans of the armed forces and the population in general; and
- 3. Promoting social inclusion among Veterans of the armed forces with PTSD in prisons through counselling, therapy and support.

PTSD Resolution (hereinafter referred to as Resolution) provides free treatment to Military Veterans, Reservists and their families, (hereinafter referred to as clients), with the particular aim of helping those who have failed to reintegrate into a normal work and family life because of military trauma suffered during service in the armed forces. Trauma causes flashbacks, nightmares, anger and depression - often leading to violence, alcohol and substance abuse, job loss, family breakdown and even suicide.

PTSD Resolution has a UK nationwide network of 200 local therapists registered with the Human Givens Institute, which provides treatment to enable Veterans, Reservists and families to resolve the mental health problems associated with military trauma that obstruct a normal range of family and work relationships. PTSD Resolution provides a national low-cost phone line on which Veterans, Reservists, and their families can receive advice on the effects of trauma and available routes to treatment, including our own.

Resolution's research purpose has been met through the creation of a new on-line survey on The Veteran's Journey; an internal survey of procedures and process; and the preparation for a project to compare outcomes and service delivery against other providers.

PTSD Resolution continues to raise awareness through a PR and marketing programme. This programme of communication targets trauma sufferers, potential donors, related military and health organisations as well as press and **Date Health News 8**th parties.

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake. The Trustees consider that the activities described above are consistent with the Charity's objectives and fulfills the requirements of the Charity Commission's public benefit criteria.

#### Achievements and performance

a) NUMBERS HELPED: Since the charity first started operating and at year end, 3,365 men, women and children have been provided with free PTSD therapy. There were 331 referrals during the year. It is important to note that a strong trend of complex PTSD is emerging, necessitating 56 people requiring extended periods of treatment. We believe that this trend will continue going forward and the treatment of complex PTSD is evidently something the charity needs to make future plans for. Overall the total year-on-year number of those being helped is consistent with the average of six referrals per week. The engagement remains constant - around 70%.

- b) PRISONS: Resolution is committed to supporting veterans in prison the charity operates across 23 prisons and is looking to expand its reach going forward. 124 veterans in prison have been helped so far for PTSD and other mental health conditions.
- c) FAMILIES: Resolution continues to offer therapy to family members affected by trauma and treated 33 family members in this reporting year.
- d) LOCAL THERAPY: We continue to treat every qualifying person who makes contact and wishes to try the service. Once registered they are put in touch with the nearest therapist who arranges an appointment for treatment to start within a few days. The results of the treatments continue to be measured by taking clinical scores before and after treatment, which shows the change in symptoms, in an average of six sessions per treatment.
- e) POST TREATMENT PILOT: Last year a pilot exercise was initiated into setting up a Post Treatment Support Network (PTSN) for ex-clients. Three were started, in Cornwall, Kent and Scotland, with varying results. Their purpose is to offer an opportunity at a local level for Veterans who have received treatment to be able to meet each other and engage in a mutually supportive activity. The Coronavirus forced a lockdown during this reporting year, and the pilot post the lock down was put into in abeyance although it may well be reignited if the need is defined again.
- f) NHS PARTNERSHIP: Discussions continue with the NHS about working in partnership and we continue to receive referrals from GPs, TILS, and CTS (Op Courage).
- g) MILITARY CHARITY PARTNERSHIPS: Discussions are on-going with several other military charities to create more partnerships and joined-up thinking and working. In particular, Combat Stress approached us to consider some form of collaborative working. Discussions are ongoing.
- h) ROYAL COLLEGE OF PSYCHIATRY PARTNERSHIP: We engaged in the pilot year of the Quality Network for Veterans' Mental Health Service, run by the Royal College of Psychiatry, and have been accepted for a second year to qualify for full accreditation. This will then allow full membership of Contact, the collaboration of statutory and non-statutory (charity, academic and professional) organisations working to improve mental health support to the UK armed forces community including serving personnel, veterans and their families.
- i) THERAPEUTIC IMPACT EVIDENCE: We remain committed to carefully monitoring and producing evidence-based proof of the therapeutic impact Human Givens Therapy has on the veterans, reservists and the families we help. On our website, you can read the many testimonials which reflect how this practical, rapid and effective therapy has saved and changed lives. It continues to be worth reiterating that we are referenced by NICE and conform to their guidelines.
- j) TRAUMA TRAINING: We are promoting individual and group Trauma Awareness Training workshops and have now launched an on-line training service. The reasons why we feel this is so important is primarily to reduce the stigma attached to mental health and secondly to help educate companies, organisations and their teams on this critically important issue.
- k) SUICIDE RISK TRAINING: We have also started to deliver training for therapists on 'The Military Mind'; and for the staff on suicide risk.

#### PR/Marketing

PR and marketing continue to achieve excellent results with very limited expenditure. There are no salaried staff, only part time consultants using limited advertising – success is delivered via good PR and social media practice. Key features of the year are:

Social media: we are very active and post almost daily to Facebook, with over 5,000 Followers, and via Twitter and Instagram. Through these avenues and Just Giving, we receive donations from a range of sponsored initiatives by supporters. Looking forward, as with other charities, we expect that some of our future fundraising sources will be affected by the pandemic.

Traditional and broadcast media: we are 'on the radar' of the national print media, especially the defence correspondents, and are often asked to contribute and comment when military PTSD stories are written or talked about. Wherever possible we take part in national and local radio and TV programmes as they represent an important opportunity to increase awareness of the help we provide.

#### Event activities include:

- VIP Event at the House of Lords this was postponed again this year due to Coronavirus we are looking at a new date in June 2023
- Corporate Sponsor Recruitment event: we are using a prestigious City of London venue for November 2022 to invite major corporates that are signatories of the AFC, or are existing fundraising contacts.
- The Big Give matched funding: we surpassed our targets again through a coordinated campaign that brought in major sponsors
- Security Industry: we continue to work closely with ASIS and the sector in general many veterans work in the security business, so it makes sense to keep close links

#### **Fundraising**

Fundraising activities were curtailed by Coronavirus-related fears about people being together face to face, so we have been unable to host or hold most of the planned events.

The arrangements with the Lions Club and FDM group are providing a useful income in payment for case by case from groups who can see how their donation is being used for the treatment of Clients within their area.

Fundraising sponsorship events initiated by the public through Just Giving and other platforms are a great way of supporting us. We also continued to receive grants from bequests, charities, companies and individuals – all of which are important streams of revenue and we dedicate time and effort to produce the applications and information as required. Lottery England continued to support us in the year.

We take this opportunity to thank the Armed Forces Covenant Fund, the Veterans' Foundation and Lest We Forget Association for their very generous support and are so grateful for all they do to help us.

The Trustees thank each and every donor for their vital support to enable us to treat a record number of Veterans.

#### Financial review

The revenue increased from £321,995 in 2021 to £546,386 in 2022. Whilst donation income fell sharply, this was more than made up for by generous grants received amounting to £138,367 from Armed Forces Covenant Fund, Veterans Foundation, NHS England, Lest We Forget Association, The Medlock Charity and the Rifles Association. Income from the counselling contract remained broadly the same.

We received a generous legacy of £100,000 from the estate of the family of a former client. We received over £23,000 due to the excellent efforts of Jonathan Thompson's cycling marathon in the Pyrenees.

We also received numerous smaller amounts from multiple donors from the public, that in aggregate form a substantial contribution, for which we are very grateful.

Total resources expended increased by 11.5% to £258,468. Overall the charity recorded a surplus of £287,918 compared to £90,291 in the prior year. The growth in resources expended was mainly caused by the costs of paying for treatment of additional Clients as compared to the previous year.

In note 7 to the accounts, the breakdown of the costs allocated to the different activities we undertake is shown. It shows that a total of £207,468 was expended in pursuit of the charitable purposes representing almost 80% of the total costs.

#### Reserves policy

In line with Charity Commission guidelines, the trustees decided to increase the reserves from three months to six months expenditure. Reserves stand at £433,102 at the balance sheet date.

#### Risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

#### Plans for the future

The targets for next year are:

- a) Treat more Veterans, Reservists and families of the UK armed forces
- b) Teach more Veterans, companies and other organisations about the effects of trauma
- c) Continue to build sustainable sources of revenue
- d) Continue to raise awareness of trauma and modern approaches to relieving it, in order to attract donors, media and other interested parties
- e) Continue to build the evidence base using the Pragmatic Tracker application
- f) Engage in a trial to further evaluate the evidence of treatment outcomes
- g) Partnership with the Veterans Gateway
- h) Obtain full membership of Contact

#### Structure, governance and management

The charity is a limited company, incorporated on 22 April 2009 and registered as a charity on 8 December 2009.

The President is Lord Ramsbotham, and Lord Arbuthnot is Vice-President.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2022

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### Charity information

PTSD Resolution Limited is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Chantry House, 22 Upperton Road, Eastbourne, East Sussex, BN21 1BF.

#### 1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's [governing document], the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest  $\mathfrak{L}$ .

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

#### 1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

#### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

#### 1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

### 1.5 Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised when a constructive obligation exists, the payment is probable and the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular cost centre to which they relate and include irrecoverable VAT.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

#### 1 Accounting policies (Continued)

#### 1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities

#### 1.7 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include trade and other receivables and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

#### Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including trade and other payables and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade payables are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade payables are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

#### 1.8 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

#### 1.9 Taxation

PTSD Resolution Limited is a registered charity and its income is considered exempt from United Kingdom taxation.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2022

#### 2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources.
